CORE ELEMENTS

A Soft, Cohesive Color Palette

Transitional spaces rely on layered neutrals over stark contrasts.

Focus on:

- Warm whites
- Soft taupes
- Greige tones
- Muted, natural colors

Avoid:

- Cool, flat grays
- High-contrast black + white schemes
- Bold, saturated colors





Clean Lines with Subtle Detail

Furniture and decor should feel tailored—not ornate, but not stark.

Look for:

- Streamlined sofas with soft edges
- Minimal but refined trim details
- Balanced proportions



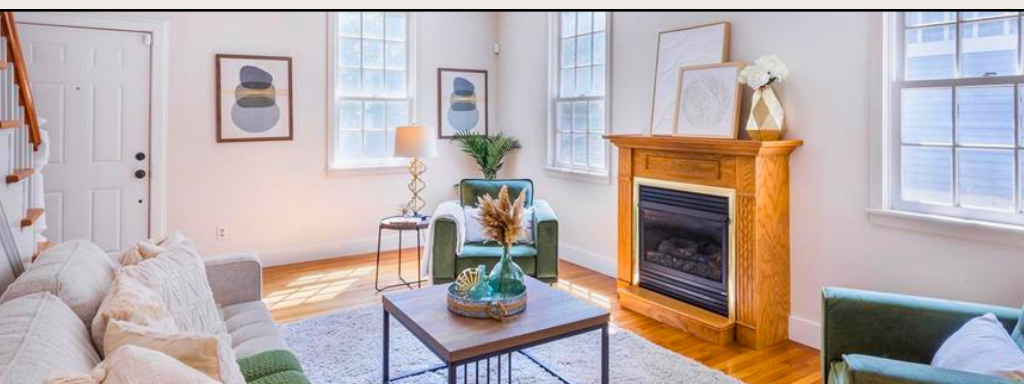
Layered Texture Over Bold Color

Instead of using color for interest, use materials and texture.

Incorporate:

- Linen and cotton textiles
- Natural wood tones
- Soft rugs with subtle pattern
- Matte or lightly brushed finishes

This creates depth while maintaining calm.



Transitional design thrives on contrast—but in a controlled way.

Combine:

- Wood + metal
- Soft textiles + structured surfaces
- Traditional shapes + modern finishes

Pro Tip:

Stick to 2–3 consistent finishes throughout the home for cohesion.





Thoughtful, Minimal Styling

Every piece should feel intentional.

- Fewer accessories, but better quality
- Simple, curated decor
- Clean surfaces with just enough layering

Rule of thumb:

If it doesn't add to the space, remove it.

1. Living Room

- Neutral sofa + layered pillows
- Clean-lined coffee table
- Simple, balanced decor



2. Kitchen

- Clear countertops
- Warm wood or neutral accents
- Updated hardware + lighting



3. Bedrooms

- Soft, neutral bedding
- Minimal decor
- Calm, cohesive palette

4. Bathrooms

- Crisp, clean styling
- Neutral towels
- Minimal accessories

MARKET INSIGHT

Transitional design works especially well in St. Louis because many homes:

- Have traditional architecture
- Feature mixed updates
- Need a bridge between old and new

This approach:

- Respects the home's character
- Modernizes without over-correcting
- Appeals to both younger and more traditional buyers

Common Mistakes to Avoid

- Mixing too many styles without cohesion
- Going too modern (cold, stark spaces)
- Keeping overly traditional, heavy elements
- Using too many competing finishes



Quick Transitional Design Checklist

- Is the color palette warm and cohesive?
- Do the furnishings feel clean but comfortable?
- Is there a balance of modern + traditional elements?
- Does the space feel calm rather than busy?
